This is the first of what will be regular communications from me to the People of the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Oregon. I hope you will find these snippets about people and happenings within the Diocese, along with thoughts and plans I might share, to be of interest in our common life.

I have chosen the name for this short newsletter quite intentionally. I have taken it from the title of a book attributed to Jean-Pierre de Caussaude, an 18th century French Jesuit priest and contemplative. The short classic bearing his name is really a compilation of letters

and writings, many to the Nuns of the Visitation, whom he served as spiritual advisor. It was known for years under the title, <u>Abandonment to Divine Providence</u>, but more recently has been renamed, <u>The Sacrament of the Present moment</u>.

I commend this short read to you, as the main theme of the writings revolve around the teaching that every moment of our lives is sacred, for God is actively engaged in our

personal histories. And though he speaks repeatedly of abandonment and self surrender, it is not a theme of drudgery and harshness he promotes. As Richard J. Foster, of <u>Celebration of Discipline</u> fame suggests, "Joy, freedom, serenity - these are words much closer to the reality to which de Caussade calls us."

And so, allow me to welcome you to my new effort for further communication, under the heading "Of Present Moments".


Welcoming the Stranger: Practicing Radical Hospitality

And I know many of you will be thrilled to know that I have also invited back our very popular speaker from last year, Juli Stratton. She also will be speaking and offering a workshop.


